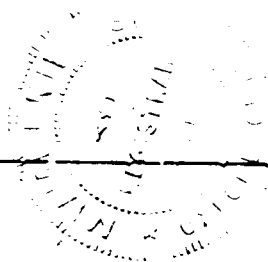




My dear Professor Furniss:

Thank you for your letter of the 19th. I greatly appreciate your kindness in relinquishing me from further obligation to the University upon deposit of 50 copies of one of my articles with the University Library. I am forwarding under separate cover, to the Librarian, fifty copies of the paper titled "Anticipatory and Inhibitory Characteristics of Delayed Conditioned Responses" from the recent issue of the Journal of Experimental Psychology. The final article in the series will most nearly represent the subject-matter and findings of my research project as a whole and I shall send fifty copies of that to the library, also, when it appears in the Journal of Comparative Psychology early in 1935.
