She further advised that subject's disappearance had been widely discussed by her friends at the College of New Rochelle, and from these discussions she recalled that one of the girls, JOAN BERBERICH, 60 River Cliff Drive, Milford, Connecticut, had once informed the girls that she had roomed with the girl friend of the subject about a year before he disappeared. Miss CHODACZEK advised that she knew nothing further in this regard. She further stated that she would notify the New Haven Office of the FBI in the event she ever obtained any information relative to the subject's whereabouts.

RAST was advised that this information was obtained from COX'S roommates, WELCH and URSCHEL, when they were interviewed by this office in September, 1951. RAST was advised that this information was contained in a report submitted by the New York Office under date of 12/18/51 a copy of which was furnished to Provest Marshal Headquarters, Governor's Island, New York.

RAST indicated this information was desired by the Commanding Officer, CID First Army. He also advised that CID First Army had made inquiry of him as to COX'S exact conversations with his roommates as to and the exact telephone conversation between Cadet HAINES and [RAST said he believed this information was desired inasmuch as an article was going to appear in "Life" magazine within the next few weeks about the COX case. RAST indicated that "Life" magazine was already aware of the information that have been an American Army Ranger.

PURPOSE:

To advise of the status of the investigation seeking to locate the captioned subject.

DETAILS:

Extensive investigation has recently been conducted in New York City by Bureau Agents with the assistance of two New York informants who are familiar with some of the in New York City. These informants have been unable to date to develop any information concerning the subject's whereabouts. The New York Division has obtained a complete list of the individuals registered at the Hotel Thayer, West Point, New York, on January 7 and 14, 1950. Leads have been set out to locate and interview each of these individuals in a further effort to ascertain the identity of the individual named who is alleged to have visited the subject at West Point prior to the subject's desertion. The men who were formerly assigned with the subject during his service as an enlisted man with the Army in Germany are still being located and interviewed concerning the identity of this unknown

The former close friend of ths subject's, Joseph Groner, who was stationed with the subject in Germany is being reinterviewed by the Philadelphia Division concerning his and the subject's association with Rose Marie Vogel during their assignment in Germany. Interview of Groner in the past indicates that he has not been entirely truthful since there was found in Cox's possession following his desertion an unmailed letter to Vogel concerning his and Groner's association with her. Groner has withheld many of the details concerning this relationship which are reflected in the unmailed letter.

ACTION:

Expeditious attention is being afforded by the New York Division to leads in this investigation and close and continuous supervision is being afforded it at the Bureau.



Sergeant OLIVER H. CCOLIDGE, JR., 1005 "IG" Special Investigative Group, Bolling Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., advised he first met COX at the U.S. Military Academy Frep School, Newburgh, New York, sometime in late January of 1948. He stated that he left the school in Lay of 1948, on a sixty day leave and has not seen COX since that date.

COOLIDGE advised that he knew CON only casually and considered him a normal individual in all respects. He added that he was in the same platoon with COX and had classes with him at the school, but could furnish no information concerning COX.

He stated that COX was full of life and appeared to take life easy while at the school. He added that COA was not a serious student and enjoyed the company of the other students. He added that COX never volunteered any information

about his service with the Army in Germany and that while speaking with COX their conversation was along ordinary veins.

He added that he never visited New York or Newburgh with COX, and never spent any considerable time with COX. He added that COX visited New York occasionally but never mentioned anything about any of his contacts or associates in New York City. He stated he felt COX visited New York for the purpose of "going on a sprees," and added that he could furnish the name of no one whom COX may have visited while in New York. He added that COX was in the company of FRANK J. COLVINI, (phonetic), on numerous occasions and that COLVINI was also a student at the Prep School. He stated that it appeared to him that COX and COLVINI may have been social friends and he advised that he does not know the present whereabouts of COLVINI.

He stated that COX visited the "Band Box" in Newburgh, New York, which COOLIDGE described as a rough spot, and the kind of place he did not care to take any of his friends. He stated that the "Band Box" was a general hangout for soldiers at the Prep School:

COOLIDGE advised that there was a Lieutenant

COOLIDGE stated that he did not have his school year book with him, but would attempt to locate the book at the home of his parents in Bedford, New York. He stated he would review this book and would advise this office of any information coming to his attention which would be beneficial concerning this investigation.

Mrs. MILTON S. FAIRFAX, Apartment 21, 2721 Ordway Street, Northwest, Washington, D. C., advised that her daughter, BARBARA ARMIGER, is presently married to First Lieutenant HOWARD JOHN VANDERSLIUS, JR., a West Point Cadet, who is a graduate of the class of 1950.

She advised that at the present time her daughter and husband are stationed at Ladd Field, Fairbanks, Alaska, AFO 731, c/o Postmaster, Seattle, Washington. She stated that VANDERSLIUS is an Infantry Officer and has Serial Number 026638.

She further advised that her daughter, BARBARA, had visited her present husband at the Military Academy, at Mest Point, on numerous occasions prior to her marriage. She added that BARBARA had mentioned the disappearance of COX, but had never given the thought much consideration. She stated that BARBARA had stated to her that this gave the Cadets something to talk about.

Mrs. FAIRFAX advised that BARBARA, after each visit to West Point, would always talk about "an old army man" at the Thayer Hotel, and BARBARA stated that this individual knew all the Cadets and everything about West Point. She added that BARBARA was quite impressed by this individual and BARBARA considered him "a character." Mrs. FAIRFAX advised to the best of her knowledge, BARBARA stated this individual was the head waiter at the Hotel, and to the best of her memory his name was CARNAY or a similar Irish name.

In view of the information furnished by Mrs. FAIRFAI, no lead to interview her daughter, who is presently residing in Alaska with her husband, is being set forth.

LA BAR informed that he could not recall seeing COX around the Thayer Hotel on January 14, 1950 and recalls no unusual incidents occurring at the hotel on that night.

On one occasion she and a group of her girl friends were invited to Camp Buckner to attend a dance which was held for the cadets there. On that occasion a girl friend of hers named PEGGY WEAVER, who presently resides on Route 23, Pompton Plains, N. J., was paired off with subject COX as his date for the evening. Mrs. O'GRADY stated she met COX on that occasion but had never seen him at any subsequent time. However, PEGGY WEAVER at the time the publicity concerning COX's disappearance was in the newspapers reminded her that COX was the one with whom she, PEGGY WEAVER, had had a date at Camp Buckner the previous summer. as set forth above.

PEGGY WEAVER, Route 23, Pompton Plains, N. J., confirmed the above information. She stated she clearly recalled the subject as the cadet with whom she had been paired with as his date for the evening on the occasion of the above-described dance at Camp Buckmer during the summer of 1949. She stated that this was the only time she had ever seen COX and had never had any subsequent dates with him nor did she see him thereafter. She advised that their conversation that evening was more or less "small talk" and she could not recall COX making any remarks concerning his background, associates, or acquaintances which would be of any material assistance in the investigation in instant case.

PEGGY WEAVER stated that she never corresponded with COX or had any contact with him subsequent to the above-described dance occasion at Camp Buckner.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent RAYMOND J. GORHAM:

Mr. CHARLES BLESSING, OSI, McGuire Air Force Base, Fort Dix, N. J., advised that he caused a check to be made of Air Force Records at McGuire Air Force Base in regard to Private First Class DOUGLAS M. GRAVEL.

Records at McGuire Base reflect that this individual was discharged from McGuire Air Force Base on 11/10/50 under Special Order 240, Paragraph 2, dated 11/9/50. His home address was listed as Fargo, North Dakota. GRAVEL's Air Force Serial Number was listed as AF 57504358, and was assigned to the 52nd Fighter Intercepter Group, McGuire Air Force Base.

It is to be noted that there is no street address for GRAVEL at McGuire Air Force Base.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent GENE M. NORRIS:

Check of available directories fail to reflect anyone by the name of DALLENBACH in Middletown, N. J. Chief ŁARL HOYER, Middletown Township Police Department, advised there is no Rice or Ruci Street in Middletown, N. J. He advised he has never known or heard of a DALLENBACH family in Middletown.

It is to be noted that Middletown Township consists chiefly of a rural area, and it is believed probable that JOAN DALLENBACH of 441 Rice or Ruci Street, Middletown, N. J., is incorrect and it should probably read Middletown, New York.

The following investigation was conducted by the writer:

Miss NANCY COYNE, 521 Muriel Parkway, Elizabeth, N. J., advised that she and her sister, KATHLEEN, were frequent visitors to West Point during 1949 and 1950. She stated that she never met COX and was unable to recall any circumstance connected with her visits to West Point which would in any way explain COX's disappearance. She related that her sister, KATHLEEN, recently married Lieutenant WALTER MILLER and that both are now on their honeymoon in New York City. She stated that Lieutenant MILLER will be stationed at Fort Campbell, Kentucky.

Miss COYNE stated that she and her sister frequently discussed COX's disappearance and she was certain that her sister has no information concerning COX.

Miss GEORGIA R. MARVIN, 750 East Front Street, Plainfield, N. J., advised that she is now the wife of Mr. PAUL B. MURRAY and that she formerly resided at 15 Maple Street, Ridgefield Park, N. J. She related that during 1950 she made several visits to West Point to visit cadets but was unable to recall the name of any of the cadets she visited. She stated that she normally stayed at the Hotel Thayer. She disclosed that she never met COX and could not recall ever discussing his disappearance with any of her friends, although the newspaper publicity concerning COX's disappearance recalled to her mind that she was at West Point at the time he was reported missing.

Miss MARY BOYDEN, Pompton Lakes Nursing Home, Pompton Lakes, N. J., advised that she was a guest at the Hotel Theyer during the week end of 1/14/50, but she could recall no unusual incident occurring at the hotel which would suggest any information concerning COX's disappearance. She stated that she never met COX and could not recall discussing his disappearance with anyone.

Miss JUDY DI PAOLA, 293 Engle Street, Tenafly, N. J., advised that she was a guest at the Hotel Thayer during the week end of 1/14/50. She recalled that she was at the ice house at West Point on Sunday, 1/15/50, when a search was being conducted for COX. She recalled that she was with Cadet STAN SHERIDAN, who was a member of Company B-1 or K-2. She stated that she never met COX and, although his disappearance was discussed by her with friends at the Point, she never learned anything concerning COX which would explain his disappearance.

Mrs. BERNICE THORNE, 18 Sheridan Avenue, Roselle, N. J., advised that her maiden name was BRUCKNER. She recalled being a guest at the Hotel Thayer on the week end of 1/14/50. She stated that she never met COX and could recall no unusual incident connected with her stay at West Point which would explain COX's disappearance.

Miss MARY LOU BEPPLER, 2615 Hudson Boulevard, Union City, N. J., advised that she formerly resided at 4606 Hudson Boulevard and that during the week end of 1/14/50 she was a guest at the Hotel Thayer. She stated that she never met COX and could recall no incident connected with her visit at West Point which would throw any light on his disappearance.

Miss CAROL ARNDT, 126 Jefferson Avenue, Cresskill, N. J., advised that she and her sister, JEANNE ARNDT, were guests at the Hotel Thayer during the week ends of January 7 and 14, 1950. She stated that she never met COX and could recall nothing that occurred during either of the week ends which would suggest an explanation for his disappearance. She also disclosed that her sister, JEANNE, is now married to Ensign BARBER of the U. S. Navy and that they are residing at 95 Afton Parkway, Cradock, Virginia, located just outside of Portsmouth. Miss ARNDT stated that she was with her sister constantly during both week ends and that she recalled discussing with her sister COX's disappearance, and she is certain that her sister had no knowledge of COX and could furnish no information of value to this investigation.

In view of the statement made by CAROL ARNDT, no lead has been set out to interview her sister, JEANNE BARBER.

Mrs. A. BIRKBY, 135 Satterthwaite Avenue, Nutley, N. J., advised that her daughter, PHYLLIS, is now attending Women's College, University of North Carolina, Greensboro, North Carolina, and that she could be reached at Winfield Building #321.

The photograph of COX was displayed to all of the persons listed above who were guests at the Hotel Thayer, but none was able to recall that they had ever met or talked with COX.

Mrs. KATHRINE V. ALEXANDER, 6022 N. Wilson Boulevard, Arlington, Virginia, was interviewed by Agents of this office. Mrs. ALEXANDER received the Agents with a fixed grin and a vacant stare. When her letter to the Bureau was acknowledged, she expressed surprise that Mr. HOOVER would pay any attention to her letter of April 14, 1952 stating that many people consider the predictions made by astrologers are fortune telling.

Mrs. ALEXANDER related that her basis for the information furnished in her letter to the Bureau is her study of astrology and the use of mathematics. She commented that she has no factual basis for this information other than the mathematical calculations she has made, saying that the Universe is constant and the stars are fixed. She said that the only thing she knows about the subject is what she read about him in the issue of Life Magazine dated April 14, 1952. Mrs. ALEXANDER added that made one slight miscalculation in "chart" for the subject and it should be corrected to read that his "death" occurred northeast of West Point instead of Southeast of that location. She remarked that she has studied astrology for twenty years and from that knowledge and the use of mathematics she is able to predict many events, but she did not elaborate as to what events she had predicted.

Mrs. ALEXANDER stated that she studied astrology in the Church of Light in Los Angeles, California.

Inasmuch as Mrs. ALEXANDER has no factual basis for the statements she has made in her letter of April 14, 1952 to the Bureau, no further action is being taken in this matter at the present time.



My dear Mr Hoover:

Regarding the disappearance of Cadet Cox of The U. S. Military Academy as described in Life Magazine of last week, I have the following information to give you.

I am an old lady, sixty years old and have spent twenty years in the study of higher mathematics, for the Universe and everything in it can be figured accurately. Given a location, longitude and latitude plus a birthdate and birth location and by coordinating both, the event taking place at that location for that particular individual the particular event for him can be described.

Cadet Cox gave his life for the ideals of his country within an hour or so after 6.18 P.M. Jan 18, 1950. It was a violent action and he died by drowning. The event took place on a short journey in a thickly populated area South-east of West Point in a location where there are many resteraunts nearby - where jewelry is made, food and other luxury items are sold & used. The action was not caused because of money, and was not anticipated by Cadet Cox.

The following is a description of his assailant who is probably a communist or has communist tendencies. While this person was inferior to Cadet Cox, he has a keen mind and does not need money.

Tall, slender, perhaps a sauguin complexion, is blond or light brown hair with plentiful rather curly hair, the type of hair that fades in color toward middle age and falls out at the temples. He is blue-eyed. His face is thin but of heart-shaped formation, has sort of a shapeliness of form rather than the thin-type of face associated with thin people. The forehead is high tending to slope back. The head is high in the crown, for he is a mental type. His body is muscular. He likes sports.

His eyebrows and lashes are but very little darker than his hair. His eyes are round, restless in expression. He tends to hold his head slightly on one side. He may have a nervous twitch to his eye-lid. His ears are large, long, may even stick out. He hears well. The nose is aquiline, high on the bridge, but not wise across the face.

He changes his environment often.

In walking he swings decidely from the hips. His feet are long. He walks very fast.

He is a rapid speaker - so much so, he may even stutter at times

because of his extreme nervous energy.

He is witty, likeable, a born salesman & promoter but extremely careless of details. He is inquisitive likes to know everyting about everybody; likes to talk about himself. He likes to change his dress frequently to suit his various activities. He will buy anything new offered him, especially the newest mechanical devises, the latest car. His actions must be fast. He is a great traveller, a gambler. Army records will show birth between Nov 23 - Dec 21.

Since this character is careless of details, a recheck of alibis would be advisable. A woman is involved. The location to which the letter to "Alice" was mailed could be of further help. She is living in a large institution for women - maybe working there and it is probably a foreign one.

I trust that you will not disregard the value of these calculated results. Though I do not do this professionally, I feel it is my patriotic duty to give you this scientific data. My work was of assistance in one particular instance when there was a mix-up in Naval orders in the beginning of the last war, and in many other occasions of similar nature. Because a couple of professors at Harvard have successfully and jealously blocked the use of this scientific method of deduction is no reason why it cannot be used for benefit.



JONES advised that he was friendly with the subject, but did not associate with him socially. He states that he has not seen or heard from him since they left school in June, 1948, and has no information concerning his present whereabouts. JONES states that immediately upon the mentioning of the subject's name, he associated him with FRANK P. COLPINI, Sergeant, Chemical Corps, 317 Fiftieth Street, West New York. New Jersey. Inasmuch as these two men were close friends and associated with one another during their time off from school, he further advised that, as he recalls, COX and COLPINI knew each other before coming to the school, and he was of the opinion that they had both previously been stationed at the same Army base in Germany.

It is noted that she advises that she noticed the article and photographs of Cox in a Life Magazine and believes that the individual she saw might be identical with Cox

However, it is desired that an Agent of the New Haven Division discreetly contact Miss Olson to determine if she has any pertinent information concerning the whereabouts of captioned subject. Reference: Report of Special Agent dated Docember 18, 1950, at New Haven, Connecticut.

Referenced report advised that one WILLIAM R. RUSSELL, a former namber of Troop D, 27th Constabulary Squadron, Schweinfurt, Germany, stated that he had recalled the subject being in his Company and was unable to furnish information concerning his whomeabouts, except to advise the name of an individual whom he believed to be friendly with COX, namely, CECIL W. MASSEY of Grantville, Georgia.

On April 29, 1952, WILLIAM R. RUSSELL, who is at present a Connecticut State Trooper stationed at the Hartford, Conn. Barracks, called the Hartford Resident Agency and desired to speak to the writer of referenced report.

Trooper RUSSELL was interviewed at the Hartford, Conn. Barracks of the Connecticut State Police and advised that in June of 1947, he was stationed in a Provisional Training Company at Kitzen, Germany, APO No. 800, with an individual whom he recalled as "RED", whose true name RUSSELL did not know. He stated that "RED" was formerly in a Ranger Outfit and held MOS 002, which RUSSELL stated was that of a Hang-Man. He stated that "RED" had done prior service during the war and often spoke of his hangings of German soldiers, civilians and of a German woman whom he got pregnant. He stated that he was trensferred from the Provisional Training Company in September of 1947 to the 27th Constabulary Squadron, Company C. He stated that while in this Company, he ran into "RED", who was then assigned to Company D. of the 27th Constabulary Equadron. He stated that "RED", prior to being assigned to the 27th Constabulary Squadron, had been with the 22nd Squadron, stationed at Hammilburg, Germany, where he was in charge of Inlisted Men's Beer Club.

RUSSELL stated that "RED", to his recollection, is described as 5'10", 165 to 175 lbs., and at that time, about 2h years of age. He had a light complexion and light brown hair, error cut.

RUSSELL advised that CECIL W. MASSEY was also a former Ranger and he stated that MASSEY, COX and an unknown individual, who was a personal friend of ANEREW J. RIDGEWAY, 321 French Street, Atlantic City, New Jersey, were room-mates in the 27th Constabulary. RUSSELL stated that MASSEY was friendly with "RED" and advised that MASSEY was a fighter, who often spoke of the hangings that the Rangers had to do in Germany.

RUSSELL made available a photograph of MASSEY, taken when MASSEY was assigned to the 27th Constabulary. He stated that the picture shows MASSEY with his hands in his pockets and his left foot forward, so that all of his weight is on his right leg. RUSSELL stated that MASSEY stood in this exact position at all times while talking to individuals, unless he was standing at attention, and that it was apparently a characteristic of his, either developed through his growth or because of an accident which he had received during the war.

RUSSELL advised that he had read the story concerning COK's disappearance in the recent Life Magazine, and he had given the situation further consideration and felt that of all of those in the Troop in Germany, the unknown individual whom he called "RED" would be the logical suspect.

RUSSELL suggested that if any photographs which COX may have had in his possession at West Point or at his home concerning his Army Service were made available for perusal by former acquaintances of COX in the 27th Constabulary Squadron, they might be of value in determining some of his associates. RUSSELL stated that COX had a girlfriend in Germany with whom he was quite friendly and whom COX had stated he made pregnant. RUSSELL was unable to furnish any further information concerning COX or other associates.

No leads are being set forth by the New Haven Office to contact MASSEY or RIDGEWAY, inasmuch as the investigation of these individuals may have already been completed and the extent of the contemplated investigation of the office of origin is not known.



SE 79-35 the subject very well. He stated that he first met the subject around the end of June in 1948, when they were both assigned to Stewart Air Force Base, New York. He went on to say that all appointees to the U. S. Military Academy entering under regular Army competitive examinations were first sent to Stewart for preparatory school training prior to officially entering the Academy. He advised that he and the subject immediately struck up a friendship and went on leave together five or six times during their three months! stay at the base. He went on to say that they frequently went to Newburgh, New York to a bar in one of the hotels where they engaged in very heavy drinking. He stated that COX was a very heavy drinker and could hold his liquor very well. JOHNSON stated that on one or two of the leaves, they went in the company of several other appointees to New York City and frequently ended up in Greenwich Village. He stated that his memory concerning these occasions was not very clear but that he can recall some of the fellows stating that it

was their practice when they ran low of funds to make friends with an obvious homosexual and go to his room and "roll him".

It is to be noted that JOHNSON would never make a definite statement of fact that he actually saw COX perform any of these "roll jobs" as he called .them.

JOHNSON stated that all of his close association with the subject was during their stay at Stewart prior to the appointment to the Academy. He went on to point out that after their entrance into the Academy, he more or less lost contact with the subject due to several factors. One factor was that regiments at the Military Academy are organized according to the men's height and he, JOHNSON, was considerably taller than the subject, and, therefore, was Another factor was that billeted two or three regiments away from the subject. JOHNSON almost immediately made the varsity football team, and, therefore, associated with his fellow players.

He went on to say that from the time of their entrance together in September, 1948, until the subject's disappearance in January, 1950, he never went out with him and merely greeted him on the campus whenever he saw him. He further added that COX was apparently well liked by the members of his regiment because he was elected Company Commander every term during his stay at the Point.

JOHNSON advised that after the subject's disappearance, there was naturally much speculation as to the whereabouts of the subject. He stated that it is his belief that the subject is probably living incognito in Greenwich Village.

It should be noted that JOHNSON was one of the 90 cadets dismissed from the Academy during August of 1951, for cheating on examinations.

The following information was voluntarily given to the writer by HERBERT L. JOHNSON during the two hour interview conducted regarding this case:

He continually endeavored to "run-down" the Academy and the "public myth" that all the cadets there were clean-living, upright individuals. He said that he often would spend weekends in the company of other cadets and girls from Radcliffe and Vassar Colleges in a cave up on the hill overlooking the Hudson River. They would sleep together in sleeping bags and have liquor and get all "drunked-up". On these occasions it was easy to just sign-out for the weekend on the honor system and then go to the cave where they would take turns standing guard while the party continued day and night in the cave.

Many times he would go to New York on the weekend with a group of cadets and "shack-up" in hotels with girls. He said that these things became easier to do as he advanced in the Academy and he benefited by Upperclassmen privileges. Since he was a "first-string" member of the Varsity Football team, these breaches of the code were usually overlooked and he did not have to take the usual penalty of walking "tours". Oftentimes, after a big game in New York he and other players would go on an all-night "binge" and shack-up. Twice on the following morning, a Sunday, he came staggering in to the Academy and passed Colonel BLACK, the coach, and said "hello" and nothing ever happened.

He bitterly attacked the Academy's handling of the "cribbing scandal" of August, 1951, in which he and some 90 other cadets were expelled. He said the investigation of this was a "farce" and many boys were unjustly punished. He said many more boys were involved, but lied about it and were exonerated.

He stated that he hoped the Academy would be completely investigated and all of these irregularities be "aired" to the taxpaying public.

If any human hair is found in the enlisted man's caps belonging to Cadet COX, it is requested that the characteristics of the hair be compared with the characteristics of the hair in Specimen Q1 to determine if there is any similarity.

It is also requested that the Laboratory advise if, in an examination of this type, it can be determined if both specimens of human hair could have come from the same person.

It is requested that the enlisted man's caps be returned inasmuch as Mrs. RUPERT COX, Mansfield, Ohio, has requested that they be returned to her.

Specimen Ql may be retained by the Laboratory if desired.

For the information of the FBI Laboratory Cadet COX disappeared from West Point 1/14/50. His whereabouts since that time are unknown. 326

The following is the complete text of the letter received May 21, 1952, by Mrs. RUPERT COX:

"Mrs. Cox,

"Sorry to open a wound, but I have reason to believe your son RICHARD, missing since January, 1950, is in the vicinity of Bennington, Michigan. lived in Owosso, Michigan, and in April, 1950, I met a young man who gave his name as JOHNAY POWERS. He was between 22 and 25 years old. Blue eyes, brown growing-out crew cut, weight about 165 or so and about five feet eleven inches tall. He was a nice looking boy. He was quite muscular looking.

"I went with him for two or three months and he wanted me to marry him in July, but I met another fellow and married him in March, 1951. However, I do see this fellow that calls himself JOHNNY POWERS every so often and he visits us once in a while. I have more reason to believe this is not his name as when he first told me it he said it was DICK, then after he said DICK was just a nickname.

"He has a buddy with him by the name of is about the same heights as JOHNNY. He was husky and rather large shouldered. They said something about being army buddies in 1947 or 1948. Someplace around there anyway. They were quite close.

She was certain this individual called at her house on April 2, 1952, representing some type of organization. She stated that on the morning of that day this man rang her door bell and when she answered he said he would like to come in and talk to her. He mentioned the name of an organization he was supposed to be representing, but Mrs. MARCHETTI could not recall it at the present time. She told the salesman she was not interested and he said that he had something interesting to tell her. She became afraid and closed the door. She then watched the salesman and observed him until he walked out of sight. She thought nothing further of this incident until reading the article in Life Magazine.

According to Mrs. MARCHETTI, this man looked as though he was in a trance. She described his eyes as having a pleading look and as slanting down at the ends. Master Sergeant CARL S. GLASS, 502 ASU Military Police Detachment, advised records of the Post Locator reflected the following information concerning a Sergeant BOBBY G. COK, ASN RA 14250609:

Sgt. BOBBY G. COX, 25th Field Artillery, Ft. Riley, Kansas, was placed on Detached Service December 22, 1950 and assigned to the Leadership School, Ft. Riley, Kansas. On March 19, 1951 Sgt. COX was transferred to Company F, Army Officer Candidate Division. On August 29, 1951 Sgt. COX was commissioned Second Lieutenant and was assigned to the Provost Marshal's General School, Camp Gordom, Georgia. M/S M. C. DE MARS, Personnel Sergeant Major, Army Officer Candidate, Camp Forsyth, produced a copy of "The Foxhole", year book, Army Officer Candidate Division Class 33, Ft. Riley, Kansas, and compared the picture of subject with the picture of BOBBY G. COX. M/S DE MARS advised in his opinion there was absolutely no resemblance between the photograph of subject and the photograph of BOBBY G. COX.

M/S DEMARS informed the index cards he maintains on former graduates of the Officer Candidate School, Camp Forsyth reflected that BOBBY G. COX had been born in 1929, place of birth not shown and indicated a home address of 405 West Mountain Street, Kings Mountain, North Carolina.

Corporal ROBERT B. LAIDLOW, clerk, Personnel Division, Army Officer Candidate School, Camp Forsyth, stated he had been a personal friend of BOBBY G. COX when COX attended the Army Officer Candidate School in 1951 and he informed there

was absolutely no similarity between subject and BOBBY G. COX.

Capt. M. S. COLLER, Grade and Record Officer, Army General School, produced the permanent record of BOBBY G. COX, which record bears a photograph of this individual and he informed that in his opinion there was no similarity between the photograph of subject and BOBBY G. COX.

M/S D. T. DRIFTI, Section Chief, Army General School, stated in his opinion there was no similarity between the photograph of subject and the photograph of BOBBY G. COX.

AT KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI:

The following investigation was conducted by SA W. CLARK FULLER:

On 4/24/52 information was received from Detective THOMAS BOTTS, No. 1 Station, Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department, that subject might possibly be hanging around the drug store located at the intersection of 9th and Cherry Streets.

JEAN RINER, clerk, Ben Casey Drug Store, was contacted and she exhibited in feature article concerning subject appearing in the "Life" Magazine, date of issue April 18, 1952. She informed she thought she had seen subject in the drug store for over a period of several months.

A check made at the Blackstone Hotel nonnected to the Ben Casey Drug Store was unproductive.

JEAN RINER was re-contacted on May 1, 1952 and she advised than an individual she thought identical with subject had again been in the drug store but she had not called the FBI because her employer, ROBERT RABINOWITZ, had instructed her not to for fear of reprisal. Miss RINER stated that the individual she thought identical with the subject was residing

at the Blackstone Hotel and was sharing a room with another individual who was taller and black-haired.

Mr. GEORGE HOOPER, manager of the Blackstone Hotel, was re-interviewed and he advised that subject was not residing at that address. He stated that the party that Miss JEAN RINER had in mind was undoubtedly who resided in Room 306 with his He informed that had resided there since March 15, 1952 and that he had checked out of the hotel on May 1, 1952 to accept an overseas position with some branch of the Government service.
HOOPER further informed that had previously been employed by the Electro Storage Battery Manufacturing Company, 129 Benton Blvd. and was definitely not identical with COX. He said that had left a forwarding address in care of DELLA OIFIELD, Route #2, Stockton, Missouri, where all mail should be forwarded.
On May 5, 1952 CARL A. ERNST, Asst. Superintendent, Electro Storage Battery Manufacturing Company, 129 Belmont Avenue, was contacted and made available the personnel file on which reflected that was born at Stockton, Mo., FBI Selective Service No. and that he had a grade school education obtained at El Dorado Springs, Mo.
