DETAILS:

AT VANCOUVER, WASHINGTON:

Mrs. F. O. JOHNSON, 1615 Daniels, advised that she has never heard of the subject of this case and is certain that he is not related to her in any way. She explained that her daughter, formerly HARRIET COLVIN, while residing at New York City, had become engaged to marry a West Point Cadet, HARRY DODGE, but that this marriage did not take place. She pointed out that HARRIET, during June of 1950, had returned to Vancouver, Washington, while HARRY DODGE had returned to Texas and married another girl. Subsequently HARRIET had married a Vancouver man, ORLIN SMITH, and is now residing with him at 503 Pennsylvania, Lansing, Michigan.

By letter dated October 28, 1952, the New York Office advise as follows:

On 1/7/50 HARRIET COLVIN, 50 Nevins Street, Brooklyn, New York was registered at the Hotel Thayer, West Point, New York.

On 1/7/50, the fugitive then a cadet at the U.S. Military Academy,
West Point, New York signed out in the company departure book for a dining privilege. COX was bound by the Honor Code to dine at the Hotel Thayer with a guest.
COX indicated to roommates that his guest on this dining privilege was one,
who served overseas in Germany with him. COX was last seen on 1/14/50.

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Miss V. BOESEWILL, HARRIET JUDSON, Y.W.C.A., 50 Nevins Street, Brooklyn, New York advised that Miss COLVIN moved out on 6/3/50 at which time she stated her intentions to marry. It is believed she married a cadet. There was no forwarding address in the record. The address of Miss COLVIN's mother, Mrs. J. O. JOHNSON was given as 1615 Daniels Street, Vancouver, Washington.

Seattle is requested to locate HARRIET COLVIN. She should be interviewed for any information she may have concerning COX and whether or not she can recall seeing COX at the Hotel Thayer on 1/7/50. Attention is directed to the fact that COX's middle name is COLVIN which is believed to be his mother's maiden name. Inquiries should be make to determine any existing relationship. Surep

MILLER further advised that the above described individual appeared to be making notes from technical books in a manner which indicated that said individual was rather proficient at note taking and more than likely had had considerable education.

MILLER further advised that his mother, Mrs. HAROLD E. MILLER, had seen the same individual December 11, 1952, at the Anne Wallace Branch of the Atlanta Public Library and was positive that said shabby individual greatly resembled COX, a picture of whom they had seen in the April 14, 1952, issue of Life Magazine.

The following individuals, employees of the Atlanta Public Library and Anne Wallace Branch were shown a photograph of COX with negative results:

EDITH WYATT - Anne Wallace Librarian ALMA JAMESON - Assistant Librarian, Atlanta Public Library

Miss EUNICE COSTON - Public Service Department, Atlanta Public Library

Mr. RANDOLPH, Maintenance, Atlanta Public Library

Miss MARTHA ANN KENDRICK, Atlanta Public Library

The above individuals advised they were unable to furnish a good description of the bearded individual reported to be COX inasmuch as they have not been able to observe him sufficiently, particularly when his face was so heavily bearded. All the above individuals remarked that in spite of the individual's make-up, it was noticeably apparent that the individual described as COX by MILLER had "young looking" skin.

Miss KENDRICK advised that said individual asked for a book in which he was attempting to locate information concerning a Jewish philosopher MOIMONIDES.

Mrs. RUTH THOMAS, Librarian, Anne Wallace Branch, advised that an individual heavily bearded and who was reported to be COX had come to the Anne Wallace Branch several weeks ago and had inquired if there were any New York newspapers in the Library. Mrs. THOMAS advised that said individual read through the paper rapidly as though he were looking for something and later read numerous books on psychology. Mrs. THOMAS furnished the following description of said individual reported to be COX:

Mrs. THOMAS was shown a picture of COX at which time Mrs. THOMAS advised that she was unable to positively state whether COX could be said bearded individual.

Mrs. HAROLD E. MILLER advised the writer, upon interview, that she had seen a heavily bearded individual at the Anne Wallace Library December 11, 1952, who, in her estimation could be no one but the missing cadet, RICHARD COX.

Mrs. MILLER furnished the following description of the individual she believed to be COX:

Mrs. MILLER further advised that she knew of a FRANK L. REDFIELD, JR., 699 Dill Avenue, S.W., whom she had overheard make remarks to the effect that he either knew or knew of COX and was reported to have said, "I don't believe he committed suicide as he was too bright, but he studied very hard and maybe cracked up."

FRANK L. REDFIELD, JR., 699 Dill Avenue, S.W. advised that he is presently a policeman with the Atlanta Police Department and attended West Point Prep School from December 1946 to December, 1947, residing both at West Point and at Stewart Field. REDFIELD advised that he knew of COX but was not personally acquainted with him and was unable to furnish any information which might lead to the location of COX. REDFIELD further advised that he was unable to recall having made said statements concerning suicide with reference to COX.

The following individuals, employees of hotels surrounding the area in which COX was reportedly seen, were interviewed and shown a photograph of COX with negative results:

It will be noted that RICHARD MILLER, after his initial report of having seen COX, made several additional calls to this office and reported seeing COX on numerous occasions. MILLER advised on one such occasion that a bearded individual was reported seen by a Mrs. A. R. HERRING, 122 North Avenue. On another occasion, MILLER advised that he had furnished additional information to CID, Ft. McPherson, Atlanta, Georgia, concerning information concerning COX.

Mrs. A. R. HERRING, Apartment 1, 122 North Avenue, advised that December 21, 1952, an individual appeared on the porch of her residence and inquired about renting an apartment in said building. HERRING advised she instructed said individual to inquire from the owner inasmuch as she had no information concerning the rental of apartments. HERRING stated the individual appeared very "peculiar" inasmuch as she noted that he was very reluctant to leave the premises after it was apparent there was no reason for him to remain. HERRING furnished the following description of said individual reported making inquiries and also reported being COX.

CID Investigator NORMAN STIEHL, Ft. McPherson, Atlanta, Georgia, Third Army, advised that MILLER, on numerous occasions, as many as ten times a day, has made phone calls to furnish information concerning COX to the CID. STIEHL advised that on one occasion MILLER stated that he, MILLER, had found several cats with



their throats slit, several pairs of pants and neatly stacked empty whisky bottles in Grant Field, Georgia School of Technology. STIEHL further advised that he originally felt the information received from MILLER, at which time MILLER advised that he had seen an individual resembling COX at several libraries in Atlanta, was reliable and reasonable. However, recently the information being received from MILLER indicates that MILLER is very excited about the disappearance of COX and actually may be very unreliable.

STIEHL advised that MILLER had reportedly stated that he, MILLER, had made inquiries as to whether it was possible for a human being to maintain himself on animal blood, taking into consideration the possibility that COX might be hiding in the area of Grant Field and consuming animal blood to maintain sustenance.

STIEHL advised that a report from CID, First Army, New York, received several months ago, had reflected that COX was reportedly seen in Atlanta from approximately December, 1951, to March 17, 1952. STIEHL furnished the following signed statement from one ANTHONY F. McGOVERN, JR., PFC, U. S. Army, said statement being taken from McGOVERN by Agent JOHN J. HAYDUK, Chief, CID, First Army, New York:

"DATE: 28 August 1952

"On about 24 day of Nov. 1951 I was in Atlanta, Ga. near the Grayhound Bus Depot and seen the man RICHARD C. COX the second time I saw the man during the Christmas Holidays he was near the same location, during the period from Dec. to March I saw COX several times although we never talked or became friendly. The last time I seen him was March 17, 1952, in the Atlanta Bus Depot I was on my way home.

"The reason I believe the person I saw in Atlanta is RICHARD C. COX is because I usually remember a face, he carried himself as a good soldier would, my guess is that he's working at the Bus Depot or near there.

STIEHL advised that CID, Ft. McPherson, had made inquiries at the Atlanta Bus Depot in reference to COX with negative results.

Sergeants C. W. BLACKWELL and E. H. HAWKINS, Atlanta Police Department, Missing Persons Division, were advised of information being received in this office in reference to COX at which time BLACKWELL stated that he would watch for any information that might possibly lead to the whereabouts of COX and report it to this office.

In reference to the signed statement taken from McGOVERN by First Army, CID, Agent HAYDUK at New York, it is noted that McGOVERN gave a none too logical explanation as to why he was able to recognize COX nor why he delayed in reporting having seen COX. In this respect, it will be noted that COX was reportedly seen by McGOVERN in a period from December 1951 to March 17, 1952, but said signed statement was not taken from McGOVERN until August 28, 1952. It is suggested that contact be made with First Army CID Agents to determine whether or not re-interview with McGOVERN at this time would be necessary.



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

Miss BOSCH also explained that any taxi drivers who were caught taking liquor on to the military academy reservation would automatically lose his license to operate a taxi cab on the reservation. It was her opinion that no driver would be foolish enough to do this. Any money that a cab driver could earn carrying on this activity would be so insignificant that there would be no incentive to risk the loss of a license. Hiss BOSCH explained further that the cadets at the United States Hilitary Academy can easily obtain liquor by having their girlfriends, relatives or other acquaintances bring it to them. This would be a simple practice and would not necessatate the services of a cab driver.

All of the above advised that they have no record of any establishment by the name of "Band Box".

FRED DOWNSBOROUGH, Orange County Sheriff's Office, who has resided in the vicinity of Southfields for many years and Lieutenant JOHN E. TIERNEY, Newburgh Police Department, who has resided in the vicinity of Southfields and Newburgh all his life, each advised that they had never heard of the "Band Box".

AT WEST HAVERSTRAW, NEW YORK

The following investigation was conducted by SA GERALD J. FLYNN:

JANE DEES. West Haverstraw, New York, was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 7, 1950.

Mr. BRYON PEARSON, Contracting Office, Haverstraw Reconstruction Home, advised that Miss DEES had formerly been employed here from June 15, 1946 to July 9, 1950. She was subsequently married but her marriage name was not ascertained. Mr. PEARSON stated that Miss DEES was born on November 28, 1925 and her home address was listed as Box 136, Europa, Mississippi. Her mother's name was listed as KATE DEES, reportedly residing in the vicinity of Fort Worth, Texas at the present time.

AT CRANGEBURG, NEW YORK

The following investigation was conducted by SA GERALD J. FLYMM:

Mrs. CORINE VAN NAME, nee CORINE CORYAT, Shanks Village, was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 14, 1950. She recalled having been at the Hotel Thayer in January, 1950 while dating a cadet at the United States Military Academy. To the best of her recollection she never saw the subject and does not know anyone who knew him.

AT PEEKSKILL, NEW YORK

The following investigation was conducted by SA THOMAS J. LYNCH:

Mrs. MANCY PADEN, nee MANCY ADAMS, 986 Reynolds Street, was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 7, 1950. She advised that she had been a guest at the Motel Thayer while a student in the New Paltz Teachers College, but could furnish no information concerning the subject. She advised that Cadet BOB MC GARRY, class of 1952 and who would have been in the same class as the subject, did not even know COX.

AT POUGHEEPSIE, HEW YORK

Mrs. ROBERT SNYDER, nee GERTRUDE FILIPOWICZ, who was also known as GERTRUDE PHILLIPS, 26 Columbia Street, advised SA TRENVITH S. BASFORD that in 1943 she met RICHARD COLVIN COX at a dance at the Stewart Air Force Base. She met COX between three and five times at such dances. This period was prior to the time COX entered the United States Military Academy and while he was attending the prep school. She never saw COX away from the base. She corresponded with the subject for a brief period, but does not today have any of the subject's letters. Mrs. SNYDER said she did not see COX after he entered the United States Military Academy and could furnish no information concerning any of the other cadets or outside friends of the subject.

Mrs. JAMES T. MC GUIRE, nee PATRICIA DALTON, 38 North Williams Street, advised that she had visited the United States Military Academy several times around the pertinent period, registering at the Hotel Thayer. She did not specifically recall being there on January 14, 1950. She has no recollection of the subject, she did recall being at the Academy shortly after the subject disapeared but could furnish no information of value.

AT MIDDLITOWN, NEW YORK

b6 b7с NY 79-108 The following investigation was conducted by SA VILLIAM R. NORTON: JOAN DALLENBACH. Lill Rice or Ruci Street, advised that she was registered at the Hotel Thaver on January 14, 1950. Previous investigation at Middletown, New Jersey failed to reflect any party by the name of DALLENBACH residing there. and failed to disclose any such street address as indicated above. A check of the city directory for Middletown, New York, failed to reflect any individual or family by the name of DALLENBACH in the citv. Acting Chief of Police RUSSELL ADGATE, Middletown, New York Police Department, advised that there was no Rice or Ruci Street located in this He had never heard the name of DALLINBACH. AT HEW YORK, HEN YORK By letter dated November 13, 1952, the Bureau advised that a representative of the Department of Army had informed that the Army did not contemplate filing charges or specifications against RICHARD COLVIN COX on the basis of his desertion on January 14, 1950. The Bureau therefore instructed that only those leads which appear significant and which may result in the apprehension of the subject prior to January 14, 1953 should be covered inasmuch as on that latter date the Statute of Limitations will rule on the subject. On January 11, 1953 DANIEL MURPHY advised SA JOHN J. MC MANUS that a JOHN SLATTERY and JOSEPH IORIO, all of Greenwood Lake had been in the bar of the Hotel St. George, Brooklyn, about 4 p.m. on January 10, 1953. Thile there, a young man in a tan windbreaker and rough clothes came in and bought a drink. He had brown hair, crew cut, blue eyes and clean shaven. His hands and person were clean in contrast to his clothing. This unknown individual attempted to strike up a conversation, mentioned the COX case and wondered if COX would ever be located. MURPHY noted that when the young man paid for his drink he only had five cents left. He

NY 79-108 attempted to beg a quarter from LURPHY and his companions as he left. In the Sunday News for January 11, 1953 MURPHY read the article on the missing cadet and observed a picture of RICHARD COLVIN COX. HURPHY and his two companions each agreed that there was a great resemblance between the unidentified individual and the subject, although the unidentified individual had a nose that appeared to have been broken at one time. DICK HARRINTON, Head Bartender, Hotel St. George, Brooklyn, advised SA and the writer that he was on duty at 4 p.m. on January 10, 1953. Photographs of COX were exhibited to Mr. HARRINGTON but he did not remember them as being anyone who was at the bar on January 10, 1953. JAMES MEADE, Bartender, Hotel St. George, advised SA and the writer that he was on duty at 4 p.m. on January 10, 1953. After reviewing the photographs of COX he stated that COX appeared to be somewhat similar but not identical with an individual who had been in the bar at 4 p.m. on January 10, 1953. He recalled the individual because he asked someone to buy him a drink and then attempted to "bum a quarter". MEADE asked this unidentified individual to leave the bar and he did. Mr. MEADE pointed out that this fellow had a definite hook nose and not a definite uptilted nose as COX does. He stated that the unknown individual was at least six feet tall and had a thin, scrawny build. Mr. MEADE stated that he is five feet eight inches and stated that the unidentified individual was definitely taller than himself. Mr. IEADE stated he was positive that the individual that was in the bar at 4 p.m. on January 10, 1953 was not identical with the subject. The discrepancy in the height should also be noted. On January 12, 1953 Captain J. J. GARLAN, 10th MP, CID, advised that CID agents had interviewed BETTY SUTER, 582 3th Avenue, Brooklyn, without developing any pertinent information. Lead to interview BETTY SUTER developed because she called Governors Island and advised that she had information. Her story was a rambling, incoherent and illogical set of statements that gave the impression of mental instability.

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The Philadelphia Office by teletype dated January 16, 1953 furnished the following information:

BENNIE MARSILLIO, USS CATOCTIN, Philadelphia Naval Base, advised that a person believed to be the subject was residing at the Hotel St. George, Congress Street, Bridgeport, Connecticut. MARSILLIO advised that while traveling through New York City enroute to the Philadelphia Naval Base on the weekend of January 11, 1953 he saw a write-up on this case in the New York News and identified the person by the name of LIBBY residing at the Hotel St. George in Bridgeport, Connecticut who he believes is identical with the subject. MARSILLIO stated that LIBBY is very friendly with the daughter of the hotel owner and that he coes part time work at the hotel as well as the neighboring restaurants. MARSILLIO described LIBBY as follows:

Upon receipt of the above information from the Philadelphia Office the facts were furnished to Captain J. J. GARLAN, 10th MP, CID.

HARRIET ADAMS, 47 East 67th Street, New York City was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 14, 1950.

Mrs. R. E. KEMBERTON, Burmore School, 15th East 70th Street, New York, New York, advised that HARRIET DE WITT ADAMS had graduated from this school and was presently Mrs. RALPH G. NEWTON, JR., residing at Highland Lake Apartments, 605 East Marks Street, Orlando, Florida.

By letter dated January 15, 1953 the Miami Office advised that Lieutenant and Mrs. RECHARD C. NEWTON, JR., had moved from Orlando, Florida about December, 1952. They left a forwarding address of 4509 Perlita Street, Apartment B, New Orleans, Louisiana. Mrs. NEWTON was not interviewed.

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Mr. JACK D. GABRIEL, Ill 75th Street, Brooklyn, New York, employed Home Life Insurance Company, 253 Broadway, New York City, advised that he was a guest at the Hotel Thayer and at the time was visiting Cadet EUGENE C. FOGE. Mr. GABRIEL advised further that he had no recollection of ever meeting COX and had no recollection after reviewing COX'S picture of having seen the subject on January 14, 1950.

E. G. FOGE, 442 82nd Street, Brooklyn, advised he was in the United States Army from August, 1946 to June 30, 1948. He was overseas serving in Germany with the Signal Corps from January, 1947 to November, 1947. He then returned and attended the United States Military Academy Prep School from November, 1947 to June 30, 1948. He was a cadet at the United States Military Academy from July 1, 1948 to February, 1950 at which time he resigned from the United States Military Academy. Mr. FOGE advised that he knew the subject while they were both students at the United States Military Academy Prep School.

Mr. FOGE advised that he did not associate with COX. He knew the subject as a beer drinker and a regular fellow. Mr. FOGE stated that as far as he had observed he had never had any reason to believe the subject had any matter that he was quite certain that when JACK GABRIEL visited him on January 14, 1950 he was confined to quarters for disciplinary reasons. Mr. FOGE advised that about January 14, 1950 he had already decided to leave the United States Military Academy and stated he resigned because he desired to enter a seminary.

DIAME CROADLES, 417 North Mashington Street, Alexandria, Virginia, was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 14, 1950. She advised an agent of the Richmond Office that she did not know the subject nor does she recall anyone ever pointing him out to her. She could furnish no pertinent information in this regard.

Mrs. JAMES W. MALONEY, nee GERALDINE BOYCE, was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 14, 1950.

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Mrs. EUGEME J. BOYCE, mother of GERALDINE, advised that Mrs. MAIONEY was residing at Atascadero, California and received mail through Box 37 at the post office in that city.

By letter dated February 6, 1953 Los Angeles advised that an unsuccessful attempt had been made to contact Mrs. MALONEY prior to the date of discontinue.

GINCI DALMAS, 22 Irving Place, New York, New York was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 7, 1950. Investigation at New York City reflected that THELIA and LCUIS DALMAS had moved from 22 Irving Place on October 11, 1951 to 62-62 Woodhaven Boulevard, Rego Park, Long Island, New York.

Mr. FRANK HARVEY, Brown, Harris, Stevens Corporation, 62-60 Woodhaven Boulevard, advised that F. LOUIS DALMAS had resided at 62-62 Woodhaven Boulevard until June, 1952 at which time he moved without leaving a forwarding address.

FAITH COMMY, 210 East 77th Street, New York City, was registered at the Hotel Thayer on January 7, 1950. On August 31, 1950 Miss COMMY moved to 414 West 49th Street, New York City. On January 15, 1951 she moved to 150 West 80th Street, New York, New York.

Mr. ED MARTINEZ; Superintendent, 150 West 80th Street, advised that FAITH COMMY moved from the instant address in January, 1952. He further advised that at the time she was married and he did not know her marriage name nor would he know of any forwarding address. No forwarding address could be ascertained through the usual sources.

MRS. HAVEL COLEPAUGH MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING Richard Cox

Mrs. Colepaugh is the mother of William Curtis Colepaugh, who was convicted as a German espionage agent in 1945 and is now serving a life sentence.

By referral from the Director's Office, Mrs. Colepaugh was interviewed on June 24, 1953, by Supervisor J. W. O'Beirne.

She claimed she had information concerning hichard C. Cox ASN-C-8132 who deserted from the West Point Military Academy on January 14, 1950. Bureau investigation seeking this subject as a deserter was discontinued on January 14, 1953, when the Army withdrew its request for further Bureau investigation inasmuch as the Statute of Limitations had run.

Mrs. Colepaugh's conversation concerning this matter did not make sense and related to events which occurred in 1937 and 1938 and was in regard to associates of her son. She rambled on about other matters and appeared to be mentally incapable of carrying on an intelligent conversation.

It is noted that she has previously been interviewed by supervisors at the Seat of Government who have had the same experience with her. She was last interviewed on December 1, 1952, at which time she requested that the Director obtain a loan for her and assist in disposing of her property which she believed was being swindled from her by unknown "un-American individuals."

Mrs. Colepaugh was tactfully exactted to the elevator and no commitments were made of any kind concerning the matters discussed. She departed saying that she intended to visit James V. Bennett, Director, Bureau of Prisons to discuss the confinement of her son at Leavenworth Prison.

Ladd RECOMMENDATION

To recommend that Mrs. Colepaugh, should she again visit Harbo the Bureau, be advised that it is not believed that any information

Tracy she may have will be of assistance to the Bureau.



The Battling Cox Case

Search for Missing Cadet Revived Here

By STAN FELDER

Richard Colvin Cox, 22-year-old cadet who vanished from West Point five years ago—one of the most baffling disappearances in recent history—is believed to be alive and possibly in Washington, The News learned today.

Military authorities distributed pictures of the missing cadet to Washington police and other law enforcement agencies last week and asked them to keep a sharp lookout for him "because he may be in the area right now."


Army investigators said they received "highly important information" just last month from a "former service buddy" of Cox which led them once again to press the search.

BRIEF ENCOUNTER

The man, whose name officers refuse to disclose, told investigators he saw and spoke to Cox, now 26 years old, at the Greyhound bus station at 11th-st and New York av nw, nearly three years ago.

He said later he didn't think anything about meeting at the time as he didn't know Cox had been reforted missing.

Last month, he said, he saw a story about Cox in a pocket magazine and put "two and two together." He called military police.

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The one point that stood out in his mind, he said, was that "Cox was cold and unfriendly," especially for an old friend whom he had not seen in years.

Army officials said the conversation went something like this.

The man: "Cox . . . you are Dick Cox.'

Cox: "Yes, how are you?" The man: "Fine. Say, why

aren't you at West Point?"

Cox: "I resigned."

The man: "What are you doing

now?'

Cox: "Nothing. I think I'm going to go back to Germany.

The man said the rest of the conversation, which lasted only five minutes, was "small talk" about the "weather and things like that."

Cadet Cox's disappearance from West Point presents a tantalizing mystery.

It began with the appearance of a sinister young man in a trench coat, known only as "George." He turned up at the Academy one January afternoon in 1950, inquiring

for Cadet Cox. The cadet left the Academy grounds with his friend that afternoon and on at least two subsequent evenings that week.

He told his fellow cadets that "George" was a former soldier he had known when he was in the Army in Germany during the war. He mentioned, in an off hand way, that George had a "morbid" streak in him. He said "George" told him

that he emasculated severel Cer-mans during the war and hanged a

Cormon girl when she told him she

was bearing his child.
"George" was seen on one other occasion on the Academy grounds, apparently waiting for a chance encounter with the cadet.

Then, on a Saturday night at 6:17, Cadet Cox signed the check-out register. That was the last time he was seen.

Fellow cadets, police, the FBI and Army's criminal investigation divi-sion launched a search for him which lasted for months.

NO TRACE

Not a clue turned up.

Cox was in relatively "good spirwhen he left the Point that its" night, his roommate and friends said. He talked about things he had to do when he returned.

The foul-play theory was the only one investigators had to work on. They felt if he wanted to desert, he would have taken two civilian suits he had in his locker.

Altho he seemed to dislike "George," he apparently was not in fear of him, investigators said, and the fact that nobody was ever found has kept hopes for his safety alive.

On March 22, 1955, ROBERT MILLER EARLEY, inmate Kansas State Penitentiary, Lansing, Kansas, was interviewed at this prison. He said that over a year ago, he was reading a Red Book or a Blue Book Magazine, and he read the story of the disappearance of RICHARD COX from the U.S. Military Academy. He said he saw COX's photograph in this magazine, and he recognized this photograph as being of a young man he saw on a Greyhound bus in 1945. He said this young man got on the bus late one night about 100 miles east of Portland, Oregon, and rode to Portland. EARLEY said he also was travelling on this bus, and as they rode along in the dark, he began a conversation with the young man, but did not learn his name, his destination, background, occupation, or activities. EARLEY said he did not get a good look at the young man, as when the lights in the bus were turned on in Portland, the young man got off the bus and disappeared in the bus station.

EARLEY said that in about 1946, he was hitch-hiking in Oklahoma, and caught a ride from Muskogee, Oklahoma to Ft. Smith, Arkansas, with some man. He did not learn the man's name, address, destination, occupation, background, and did not remember his description or the make of auto in which they rode. During the ride EARLEY said that this man had told him that he had heard that the people who had set off the atom bomb in New Mexico had not been successful in setting it off the first time they tried. He said that this man told him that on the second attempt, the people had placed the atom bomb out in the sun, and the hot sunlight had set off the atom bomb.

EARLEY said he had no information regarding these two incidents other than that related above. 7 %

And it might help to answer the final enight what happened to the cadet in question, West Point hird Classman Richard Colvin Cox?

THAT, OF COURSE, is the main question, for Cox is a missing person.

It would be hard to think of a more model young man than Cox without making him a saint. He was the sort of son any family would be delighted

Cox came from a family of two boys and four girls in the town of Mansfield, Ohio. His father, Rupert F. Cox, was an insurance man until his death in 1940. His mother then took over the business. The Coxes lived in a comfortable seven-room house in the better part of town.

DICK COX worked Summers on a farm outside the city, and during the school year he went

to Mansfield High.
Cox was on the honor list throughout high school and won letters in baseball and football. His sweetheart was brown-haired Betty Timmons, the prettiest in school. When Cox was graduated he was president of his class and a member of the National High School Honor Society, which bases election on scholastic standing and character.

By graduation, Dick also knew what he wanted to do. He wanted to become an Army officer.

HE ENLISTED in the Army, after explaining his desires to Betty and getting her promise she would marry him the day he was commissioned.

After basic training he was assigned to the 27th Constabulary Squadron, then on occupa-tion duty in Germany. He served first at Schweinfurt, then at Coburg. He was made a sergeant and, at Coburg, got permission to take the com-petitive examination for West Point. Of him his commanding officer later said:

"Cox was a good man. Friendly, intelligent, alert, sincere. And real Army."

While he was awaiting the out-come of the West Point exam his mother had gotten him an appointment to West Point and he was returned to the United States in the Summer of 1948. (He ranked high on the examination list anyway.)
BUT OTHER things had hap-

pened in Germany and two them are worthy of note. had met a girl whom the Criminal Investigation Division later went to great pains to trace. Her name was not disclosed, but she was beautiful, blonde, a waitress at an inn in Lichtenfels, near the Coburg army base, and she had dates every night with American soldiers. Bangest aux il

A CID agent later traced her from Lichtenfels to Schweinfurt to Munich to Bremerhayen to Berlin. There, she had stayed in a small hotel a few Gate, on the Brandenburg Gate, on the dividing line be-tween the East and West sectors.

When the agent went to the hotel, he found he was two days late. The girl had left, gone into the East sector 48 hours before he showed up.

THIS WORRIED the authorities a good deal more than they have ever admitted. Germansin West German women—living in West Germany do not voluntarily go into the East zone except for very pressing reasons.

So much for the women. Cox

had also met a man he was to describe to friends later as "eccentric and emotional—a guy in my outfit in Germany who was always bragging about having fought with the Rangers in the war." Cox was certainly being kind

describing this man as "eccentric and emotional" for he was also the man, he told his classmates later, who boasted of mutilating Germans with his knife and of hanging his German girl friend so it would appear she had committed suicide when it was discovered she was pregnant.

IN ANY EVENT, Cox entered West Point in the Fall of 1948. There, he did as well as he did all things. He was first in his company in military aptitude, in the top third of his class in academic standing. He was on the track squad.

In short, Cox was a "model cadet."

Then, one day, on Jan. 7, 1950, the telephone rang in the quarters of Company B, Cox's unit.

Cadet Peter Hains, charge of quarters, answered.

"DO YOU HAVE a Dick Cox in your company?" a man's voice asked. "Tell him George, who served with him in Germany, is here."

When Cox was told this, he said thoughtfully: "Well, I never thought I'd see him again."

At 5:30 that afternoon, Cadet Mauro Mauresca, officer of the guard in Grant Hall, to which visitors are steered, telephoned Cox that he had a visitor.

"HE WAS JUST under six feet tall, weighed about 185 pounds, wore a belted trench coat, no hat, was a fair-skinned blond," Mauresca described the visitor later.

Cox came to the room, Mauresca continued, shook hands with the man and said: "Glad to see you." The man "kidded" Cox about his uniform, Mauresca said, and the two went out.

Cox returned to his room about 7:30 p. m., according to his roommates, Joseph Urschel and Deane Welch, and promptly fell asleep over his books.

"I TOOK A picture of him as tattoo sounded," Urschel said, "and it startled him. He ran into the hallway and yelled something."

What Cox yelled the cadets could not agree on. Some said it was: "Is Alice down there?" (who could Alice be?) and others said it was: "Alles kaput!" ("All is lost!" in German.)

When Cox returned to his room he told his friends of having had a couple of drinks with the "morbid Ranger."

"He wouldn't let me out of the car till I had a couple of drinks," Cox said and told of the man's bragging.

by 2:30 p.m. He didn't get back until 5 and complained: "This guy is wasting a lot of my time:"

Though Cox vowed he wouldn't see the man again, another cadet told investigators he'd seen Cox talking to a civilian near the East Sally Port about Jan. 10. The man wore a trench coat. That was all the description the cadet could give.

His roommates said that from the time of this man's appearance Cox began to act strangely. He would fall into fits of abstraction, staring at the wall, and slept restlessly, moaning something sounding like "Alice Cooper."

ON JAN. 14, Cox got a pass for dinner at Thayer Hall, a hetel on the grounds used by the cadets and their friends. He told Urschel and Welch he'd be back at 9:30 and at 6:18 p. m. he was walking toward Thayer. He wore a full dress uniform, which is so conspicuous someone once described it as "like carrying a lighted Christmas tree around with you," and a long gray coat.

And Cox was never seen again. He never got to the hotel, a few hundred feet away, thronged with cadets who would have recognized him. According to Military Police at the gates, the only way he could have gotten out in a car would have been to hide in the trunk.

It seems almost impossible that he could have remained on the grounds. They were searched for months by ground crews and helicopters. The ponds were drained.

AND THERE WAS not a trace of Cox.

The CID and the FBI conducted what was regarded as intensive manhunts in history. Hundreds of agents combed Germany and more than 5,000 soldiers who had been associated in any way with Cox were interviewed.

No results.
On Feb. 23 a letter was returned to West Point—a letter written by Cox the previous December to the blonde German waitress. It was stamped "Adresse Unbekannt"—"Address Unknown."

COX HAD WRITTEN in halting German, asking if she remembered him and if she would like to write to him. It was an unemotional "I'm all right, how are things with you?" type of letter. It said it contained photographs of Cox that he hoped she would like to have. But there were no photographs.

That put the CID on the trail of the girl, a trail that disappeared behind the Iron Curtain. And it brought investigators back to the question they had first asked:

Who was the man in the trench

She was no longer young, but she had not reached middle age. She was rich, nice-looking, a member of the Social Register. Her husband was rich, pleasant, a member of the Social Register. They were childless, and to get a child they made a very strange pact. Into their house moved a Russian woman of driving singleness of purpose. The wife made a will. Then she—vanished.

On September 8, 1955, Colonel and Mrs. E. O. Pavis and their son, Cadet E. O. Pavis. Jr., Quarters 21, Fort Belvoir, Virginia, telephone 5103, office extension 27122, furnished the information set out below. By way of background, Cadet Davis enlisted in the Air Force in September, 1954, with a Presidential appointment to the West Point Military Academy. He was assigned to duty as a student at the West Point Preparatory School, Stewart Air Force Base, New York. In July, 1955, he entered West Point, ranking 7th in a class of 300.

Colonel Davis stated, with the concurrence of his son, that Goodfellow held "discussions" with various students. the main

Goodfellow related instances that

gave the clear implication he did not actually say so. He also spoke against religion, stating it is a result only of various complexes and customs but has no real truth.

Arrangements had been made for Cadet Davis to return to West Point but he refused to return and apparently feared that Goodfellow would

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Goodfellow or other Cadets. He said he did not know of any such activity.

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On one occasion when Cadet Davis was talking to Goodfellow alone, Goodfellow told him that Richard Cox had attended his discussions. Goodfellow immediately cautioned Davis to never mention this fact to anyone.

West Point. Colonel Davis has submitted paring a statement of facts to be presented to the Academy concerning his son's activities with Goodfellow and is securing legal advice. He also stated the Academy has not yet been advised of the activities of Cadet Davis but has only been requested to investigate Goodfellow, based on their early belief that Goodfellow was in some way responsible for their son's leaving the Academy.
